We had been working in Akron, Ohio for several years when we were introduced to the Summit Lake neighborhood. These factors made Summit Lake a unique place to explore how we could work in partnership with residents to celebrate the people, places and culture of this neighborhood.

PUMP HOUSE CENTER FOR ART + CULTURE

We began our work in Summit Lake by listening. We conducted several months of interviews with residents and heard the desire for employment and educational opportunities and intergenerational connection in the neighborhood.

Soon afterward, we learned about the Pump House – a vacant historic building that overlooks the lake. We saw potential for the building to be transformed into an active space to facilitate connections, develop skills and job opportunities, and cultivate neighborhood pride. We hired local resident Stephanie Leonardi as a project manager, and then established and convened the Pump House Advisory Board, made up of community leaders, to inform and guide our work.

Across one year, we facilitated multiple projects and events to bring people to the space, collect their ideas for what it could become, and celebrate the creativity and culture of the neighborhood. We hired architects and contractors to understand the costs associated with renovating the building and focused our efforts on planning and executing temporary events and installations to demonstrate the need for the physical improvements to the building.

The activations resulted in the local parks department purchasing the building to create a community space.

BUILD CORPS PROGRAM

Build Corps pairs youth in the Summit Lake neighborhood with experienced fabricators and builders in Akron to create public space projects that add to the vibrancy of the neighborhood. Build Corps members learn new skills in fabrication, receive a stipend for their work, and are able to see how they can impact their community and create the neighborhood they want to live in.

Build Corps has created projects ranging from neighborhood benches to the main desk for the Community Center, and continue to be commissioned by neighborhood organizations for building projects, proving the demand for the program.

SUMMIT LAKE SHOWCASE & PHOTOBOOK

We collaborated with local photographer Shane Wynn to capture portraits of residents while we interviewed them about what they loved their neighborhood. We worked with the City of Akron and local printers to create an installation of these portraits along the Towpath Trail adjacent to the lake. These larger-than-life portraits of residents celebrate community and connect Towpath trail users to Summit Lake residents.

At the same time, youth from the Leaven Lenses Project, a youth photography apprenticeship had been taking photos all over Akron. We worked with the City of Akron and a local printer to install banner-sized images in the windows of the Pump House building, adding color and visual interest to the building. The youth were thrilled to see their photos on the building and at such large scale.

In addition, the photos were printed and published in a book "Beauty in my Neighborhood" alongside the resident portraits. We held a celebration to showcase the project, and residents swelled with pride as they saw their faces in print. Youth even signed each others books, commemorating a truly special occasion.





The Reimagining Civic Commons Studio, a gathering of community leaders from around the country was coming to Akron and wanted to showcase the power of a public space project in action. To accomplish this, we created a truly unique experience: a 200-person shared meal on a giant table at sunset on the lake with 125 neighborhood residents and 75 Reimagining Civic Commons Studio participants. The result was an evening of community celebration and showing what is possible when residents and leaders come together to learn from each other.

Food from the meal came from three different local restaurants and each attendee took home a custom stoneware plate printed with a family recipe from a local resident on it as well as a toolkit for how to put on a community meal.
